We welcome Rev. Elizabeth Schultz as the new Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Yukon. Rev. Schultz was voted in and commissioned on Friday. October 6th, 2023, as part of the worship service at the October Presbytery meeting. Rev. Elizabeth Schultz has been an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament in the PCUSA since 2006. Elizabeth holds a bachelor's degree from Juniata College and Masters of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. Elizabeth began her ministry career as a campus

minister in Pennsylvania before moving to Anchorage, Alaska in 1997 to serve as the Co-Director of Youth Ministries with her husband, Matt Schultz. From Alaska, she followed the call to seminary and to various calls in vocational ministry, working in a validated ministry call in community mission and as an Associate Pastor, focusing on youth and families, community outreach, and national and international service opportunities. Elizabeth served as the Community and Nonprofit Liaison for Governor Bill Walker from 2014 to 2018 and then as a Community Relations Manager for a local nonprofit until 2023, while also serving as a Parish Associate and Member at Large within the Presbytery of Yukon. Elizabeth and Matt are the proud parents of three children and love to call Alaska home!

News from the Synod and OGA

Toward Healing: Presbyterian Apology and Reparations for Closing Memorial Church.

An inter-agency delegation from the Office of the General Assembly

(OGA), the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA), and Northwest Coast Presbytery traveled to Juneau, Alaska from October 7th-9th 2023 to attend a Formal Service of Acknowledgement, Apology and Commitment to Reparations. The apology is one of more than a dozen steps directed by the General Assembly last summer.

As reported in September, "The 225th General Assembly approved an overture to meaningfully address the wounds inflicted on Alaska Natives, who were directly impacted by the sin of the unwarranted 1963 closure of Memorial Presbyterian Church, a thriving, multi-ethnic, intercultural church." The United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. was also responsible for dismissing Memorial's pastor, the Rev. Dr. Walter Soboleff, which caused further harm to Native communities in Juneau. The weekend events were planned through a Healing Task Force shared by members of Kunéix Hídi Northern Light United Church and Central Council of Tlingit and Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska. Many thanks to Rev. Tim Carrick, from the United Protestant Church in Palmer, Alaska, for representing the Yukon Presbytery at this event. Please read Rev. Carrick's experience in his own words:

Apology for the Closing of Memorial Presbyterian Church in Juneau Apologies are difficult. A simple "I'm sorry" is always appropriate, but sometimes before an apology can be heard or accepted, the reason for the apology needs to be addressed. In the Church we often focus on confession, forgiveness, and reconciliation ~ perhaps it is part of most of our worship liturgies. It is a powerful and moving experience when seeing it in action, even as an "outside observer" as I was last week (October 7-9) in Juneau.

Half a century after the events took place in Juneau in 1963, many people gathered to recognize deep hurts and divisions which took place under the umbrella of our denomination's "mission strategy." The Presbyterian Board of National Mission funded the birthing of a Presbyterian church for Alaska Native peoples in Juneau in the 1800's. When the Rev. Walter Soboleff was called to be their pastor in 1940 it was still an era of racial and ethnic segregation throughout much of our country. For over two decades Rev. Soboleff was the pastor of Memorial Presbyterian Church, a thriving congregation ~ a congregation ahead of its time in already being multi-ethnic and multi-racial, although predominately Alaska Native.

In the early 1960s our denomination began to "see the light" that segregation in churches was not what we wanted to be. The Board of National Missions and the Alaska Presbytery agreed. Just a few blocks from Memorial Presbyterian Church was the struggling Northern Lights Presbyterian Church ~ a Caucasian congregation. The decision makers at the time decided that to counter segregation, it would be important to bring the two congregations together to make one. Their solution was to close the thriving Memorial church and transfer all their members to the struggling Northern Lights congregation. The pastor of the Northern Lights congregation kept his job while the Rev. Walter Soboleff lost his job. A few months later after the pastor of Northern Lights church left, instead of inviting the Rev. Walter Soboleff to become the pastor, a Caucasian pastor was called. Many of the members of the former Memorial church did not choose to transition to Northern Lights church. Even a couple months before the Rev. Walter Soboleff's death at age 102, the pain was still fresh.

I attended to represent Yukon Presbytery. I did not have to say or do anything, but it seemed important to us and to them to have someone from our presbytery standing with them through the three days of events. A p.s.: The year before the Memorial church was closed and demolished,

the congregation had completed a fund-raiser to purchase new pews for their sanctuary. The new pews were a joy for the congregation. The Kunéix Hídi Northern Lights church (as its name has been changed to meaning "people's house of healing") now has those pews lining the sides of their sanctuary \sim a constant reminder of the congregation which once was.
